Hot topic: Screening boosts 10 year survival



Dr Reena Ramsaroop, chair of The NZBCF Medical Advisory Committee, shares new insights based on the latest survival data.

You'll often hear the words "five-year survival" when experts talk about cancer. But there's nothing magic about five years, and often that number is used simply because it's the best data available. Not any more – at least not for breast cancer.

Every Auckland woman diagnosed with breast cancer has her treatment and outcomes tracked in the Auckland Breast Cancer Register, funded by The New Zealand Breast Cancer Foundation. There are similar registers in Waikato, Wellington and Christchurch, but as the oldest, the Auckland Register is the first to produce 10-year survival statistics.


Those statistics show that 80% of women are now reaching the 10-year survival mark...but how their breast cancer is found makes a big difference. 92% of women with mammogram-detected invasive cancers are alive 10 years after diagnosis, compared with only 75% of those who find a lump.

The aim of treatment is to stop breast cancer spreading or coming back, and the Register shows how well we're doing that. While 82% of women are disease-free five years after diagnosis, only 73% are disease-free at 10 years. This is an important area for research into new treatments.

The ten year statistics also reveal that more advanced breast cancers are being detected in older women. Some doctors suspect this is because women have stopped getting mammograms after the free screening ends at age 69, so their cancers are diagnosed later.

The Register also offers insight into ethnicity and breast cancer. Although only 8% of patients on the Register are Maori, they have the highest incidence of breast cancer and worse outcomes, confirming previous studies. Pacific women have larger tumours, with the highest percentage of HER2+ tumours.

The Auckland Register covers a third of all breast cancer patients in New Zealand, so these findings can be broadly applied to the rest of the country. With eight women a day now being diagnosed, the Registers give us vital insight into the diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer, pinpointing inequalities and areas for future research and clinical focus.



Going strong fourteen years on

Robin Houliker remembers vividly the day she was diagnosed with breast cancer in September 2001. "Absolutely horrendous," is how she describes the way she felt. "I was confused," she admits. "I was always so vigilant, and here I was, with a large, stage 3 cancer."

Robin (pictured) was 48 when the fast-growing cancer was detected during her third regular mammogram. With a family history of breast and other cancers, she made sure she never missed one. As the shock wore off, Robin took comfort from the fact that the mammogram had found her cancer, and that she'd done everything she could to save herself.

That thought, and her determination to be around for her daughters Emily and Georgia – then aged 17 and 20 – kept her going through surgery and reconstruction, then

chemo and radiation, then ten years of hormone therapy.

The result? The loving mum is now a proud grandma to four grandchildren, with number five due at Christmas. Robin is a fit and healthy 62-year-old, in training for her third marathon. And of course, she's still getting her mammograms.

"I'm a passionate advocate for mammograms," she says. "We have a wonderful screening programme here in New Zealand. I'd say to all women out there: it's on offer, so take it. It's a life-saver."

Thanks to your generosity, money raised during May's Pink Ribbon Breakfast month will fund several exciting new research projects, with a focus on clinical trials and on new treatments for breast cancer.

In our Research Round-Up, we highlight Professor Margreet Vissers at the University of Otago in Christchurch who's researching the potential role of vitamin C in treating breast cancer, enabled by a research grant from The NZBCF. Professor Vissers has previously discovered that bowel cancer patients with higher levels of vitamin C in their tumours are more likely to be alive and disease-free. Her new study will look for the same evidence in breast tumours and could lead to a full clinical study in patients.

We're passionate about supporting research into better treatments for advanced breast cancer. Sadly, once breast cancer has spread, it's not curable. The focus becomes on helping women live longer, with the best possible quality of life. The traditional treatment for advanced breast cancer is more drugs, which of course can have serious side effects, or in the case of cancers that spread to the brain, radiation treatment that can damage the rest of the brain.

But now, improvements in technology have enabled surgical removal of some advanced tumours previously considered too hard to treat. The surgery has few side-effects and can offer women extended life.

This October during Breast Cancer Month, The NZBCF will return to its core message about the importance of mammograms for early detection. Our cover story reveals the huge difference in survival for cancer detected through a mammogram versus finding a lump. And not only do mammograms save lives, but finding a cancer early can also mean less drastic treatment.

So, expect to see us reminding you to go for your mammogram! Thank you so much for your ongoing support of The NZBCF – we couldn't do it without you.

Easy as TOUCH. LOOK. CHECK.

That's the simple message Shortland Street's Jacqueline Nairn (pictured) will promote in a new 60 second guide aimed at getting Kiwi women familiar with how their breasts normally look and feel.



That's why it's important for women to start checking their breasts from their twenties, and to consider starting regular mammograms from their forties.

"You don't have to be an expert," says Breast Nurse Janice Wood, "It's just about getting into the habit of touching or feeling for any changes and looking in the mirror for anything different. Like changes to your breast shape, skin or nipples. It's then important to get any unusual changes checked out by a doctor."

Only half of all women claim they check their breasts regularly. Being busy, forgetful or unsure of what to do are some of the reasons women don't check themselves.

The NZBCF funded Breast Cancer Patient Registers indicate that around half of all breast cancers are found by women who noticed a change and showed their doctor. Sometimes it's their partner who spots a difference.

- **Touch** – Your breasts. You're feeling for any lumps or thickening of the skin.
- **Look** – In the mirror for any physical changes to the breast shape, skin or nipples.
- **Check** – Any breast changes with your doctor. Pronto!

SPOTLIGHT ON SIGNS

Most women know to get a lump checked out. Fortunately most lumps aren't cancerous with nine out of ten proving benign. The Foundation recommends that women get any changes to the breast or nipple checked out by a health professional.



A newly inverted nipple? Get checked.

The NZBCF is promoting the importance of life saving mammograms through an emotionally charged awareness campaign featuring women with breast cancer and their loved ones. The key message? Early detection can make the difference between Relief or Despair.

We now have evidence of high survival rates for women with screening-detected breast cancer. Around 92% of these women have passed the ten-year survival mark indicating that breast cancer is much more treatable if it's found early through a regular mammogram.

We know however that around 30% of eligible women aren't in the free screening programme and government-funded advertising for the service has been reduced. New Zealand is fortunate to have a world-class free screening service for women 45-69 and as the leading breast cancer charity, we want women to know about it.*

The October campaign will be supported by the Pink Caravan Breast Nurses, who are visiting more small towns this year to give breast health advice. The Estee Lauder Companies®

Pop into the Pink Caravan

Over the next few months The NZBCF Pink Caravan will travel to 33 towns from the Far North to Southland, with our specialist breast care nurses on board. By the end of 2015, The NZBCF nurses will have given advice to people in 66 small New Zealand towns, many without breast health facilities.

"We're inviting women – and men – to pop into the Pink Caravan with their questions," says Breast Nurse Janice Wood (pictured).

"We want women to know the possible signs and symptoms of breast cancer, to understand their family and lifestyle risk factors, and to know what to do if they have any worries."

The NZBCF is also asking people to come and sign a petition to extend the free screening age to 74. Free mammograms stop at age 69 but there's good medical evidence that the breast cancer risk is higher in your 70s than your 50s. Extending the screening age also brings New Zealand into line with Australia.

The Pink Caravan is a real community project. Volunteer drivers from The NZ Motor Caravan association are towing the caravan between towns and without them this breast health programme would not be possible. To see tour towns and dates, check out www.nzbcf.org.nz/pinkcaravan.



Best care for breast cancer

A clinical pathway assists health professionals in providing the best care for patients through all stages of testing and treatment. Up until now there hasn't been a standardised Breast Symptoms pathway for GPs to follow across New Zealand.

That's why Caroline Thomas, NZBCF Breast Health Educator is leading a panel of breast cancer experts to develop a new evidence-based process to ensure every woman receives the best possible care.

"Our goal is that when women present with worrying breast symptoms, they follow an advice and treatment pathway which reflects New Zealand and international best practice. This new tool will support GP knowledge in how women should be looked after every step of the way."

The pathway tool is due to be submitted to the Auckland Regional Work Primary Care Programme for review shortly. If adopted, The NZBCF will help to promote the Breast Symptoms pathway as part of its medical education focus.



FREE counselling anyone?



Since its April launch, The NZBCF Counselling Service has enabled women with breast cancer to access individual therapy with a professional counsellor. Demand is growing as health professionals make their patients aware that the service is free to anyone with breast cancer, whatever their stage.

Your donations have enabled women to seek help when dealing with the anxiety and stress that often accompanies breast cancer. Women need to be referred for counselling by a specialist physician, breast care nurse or GP and it's accessible wherever they live.
